

ASSESSMENT OF CREDIBILITY OF RECYCLING 2013 STATISTICS FOR STEEL PACKAGING

In April 2015, Eunomia completed the annual review of APEAL's recycling rates data, covering the EU-27, as well as Switzerland and Norway. Our task was to reveal whether APEAL's 2013 recycling statistics were credible, with particular regard to those countries where their reporting methods may have changed.

We understand that APEAL's objective is to be the reference source for the annual publication of steel packaging recycling rates in Europe. To do this, APEAL seeks to use the most accurate sources of data at its disposal. In principle, all countries should report data to Eurostat regarding the recycling of packaging. However, for a given reporting year, APEAL's statistics are reported earlier than those given to Eurostat and it is not yet mandatory to report steel packaging separately from metal packaging. As a result, APEAL has developed a network of contacts for obtaining recycling performance data. This network includes those who are responsible, or upon whom Member States rely, for their reporting to Eurostat. We have found that for some countries - even some of the larger markets - the methodology of data collection is in the process of being refined. Our review has highlighted differences in data sources at national level and we have advised on the relative accuracy of each of those.

In general, we find that APEAL has gathered data which is as good as the organisation could be expected to acquire for the majority of Member States. This, therefore, represents a clear 'pass' in terms of what APEAL sets out to do.¹ However, APEAL's process is continuously improving, and we expect the precision and standardisation of the data for Europe also to improve over time.
